On Saturday November 16, South hosted its first tournament in recent years. The tournament turned out to be a huge success, if for no other reason than our Rebel Speakers won going away. Of the schools participating the "Kunkas" accumulated a whopping 230 points, good for first place. They were followed by Rich East with 203, and Thornridge with 187.

## **Debate Gets** Early Year Experience

In the last six weeks the Debate Teams have attended tournaments at West Chicago, Thornton, Hammond High, Northern Illinois University, T. F. North, Illinois State University at Normal and Hammond Morton.

In their very first tournament the Novice Team "A" compiled a record of 6 wins and 2 losses for a tie for third place among 30 schools participating at West Chicago. Jim Rosinia and Tom Gleim had a 4-0 record on the affirmative side while Tom Gosciej and Mark Schumann were 2-2. Jim Rosinia was also recognized as the "outstanding affirmative speaker" in the tournament among 60 speakers. The Junior Varsity team composed of David Banet and Jaymi Rice on the affirmative along with negatives Mike Wallace and Tim Alexander finished with a record of 5-3.

While everyone was enjoying his day off for Veteran's Day, all three debate teams traveled to nearby Thornton Township High School. The Varsity team of Affirmatives Janet Dillon and Ron Schultz, along with negatives Ron Doeve and Chris Wiedmanfinished with a record of 6-2 and tied for first place in the tournament which saw over 30 schools attending from all over the state.

The Junior Varsity team had their difficulties due to one regular members absence and thus Baran a novice debated with Bob them and put forth an "intestitudinal effort." The novice team continued to progress and finished with a 5-3 record which tied them for third place in the tournament. On Nov. 16 the Varsity team motored to Northern Illinois University where they were among 60 teams from Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin, Michigan and Indiana and finished with a 4-4 record. At Illinois State University the next weekend the varsity team competed in two days of scheduling with schools throughout the entire state and finished with a record of 8-4. The negative team had a record of 5-1. Their combined record with the Speech team allowed T.F.S. to place fourth among the 57 schools attending. On Tuesdays the debate teams compete in the Calumet Forensic League and finished with a combined record (all teams) of 20-12 at Hammond High; 12-8 at T. F. North, and 8-4 at Hammond Morton. Competing in the C.F.E. Tourneys were the Junior

Supporting and standing up for their candidates during the recent presidential race were four students from South.






