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Gifted Program:

Independent Learning

The least known program at T.F. South is probably one of the most successful. The Gifted Students Program, sponsored by Mr. Thomas Chockley, is known in detail only by those who par-ticipate in it.

The two basic activities of the program are independent learning and independent study. Mr. Chockley is working on a new program which he calls Creativity Classrooms.

Independent learning and independent study are both done on a contract basis. When a student "takes out" a contract, he states that he wishes to explore a topic not usually covered in the classroom, or a topic he wishes to research in greater detail than what is presented by the teacher.

The student then fills out a contract which lists his sources of information, his criteria for evaluation, an estimated completion date, and a penalty clause if he doesn't meet his deadline. He may present his project in any manner he wishes -- a report, or al or written; a chart; or even a movie.

In independent learning, the student works with the teacher. His topic must be relevant to one of his classes. Everything but the actual work is done with the teacher. In independent study, the student is somewhat more on his own. He may choose any topic, whether it applies to one of his classes or not. Evaluation is done almost totally by the student.

There are about 20 students working on a contract basis this year on a wide variety of topics. Students from all four years are involved, although the large part are Juniors.

This year, Mr. Chockley, along with a group of students in the program, is developing a Creativity Classroom Program. The exact details are not set up at this time, since the program is still in the theoretical stages. But basically, it will involve classrooms which will be used by students as an honor study hall in which they could work on any creative activity.

Mr. Chockley hopes that a creativity or an independent classroom will be set up for English, Science, and Social Studies. These classes would be a place in which gifted students could work on their projects.

In the past, the program has been an enjoyable and an educational experience for all involved. This year will not be an exception.

My school, Tanabu High School, has 1,200 students. During the second week in September, we went on our student trip. We went to Tokyo, Expo '70, Nara, and Kyoto. I go to school six days a

week, a full day Monday through Friday, and a half day on Saturday. And you thought you had it bad

The food here is different, but quite good. A few days ago, we had a dish called "sashime" (pronounced sa-she-me). At best, it can be described as rawfish. It was rather good. In the little more than a month I have been here, I have gained about ten pounds. And I owe all to clean living. (ha, ha).

I have to wear a uniform in school. It consists of a pair of black pants, a white shirt, a black jacket, and a black hat. It makes me look like a priest.

Well, that's all for now. Let me hear from some of you. I am interested in knowing about what's going on at South. My address is below.

Homecoming has always been a tough game to play for T.F. South. This year was no exception. Only one year prior to this season had any team won such a game. This year the final score was South 13, Stagg 7. About the only bright spot in the game was the fact that we won. Besides that, there was not much to cheer about. By far South played their worst game of the season. Mistakes were evident throughout the entire game. These mistakes were both of the mental and physical types.

After Kerry Moeller recovered a Stagg fumble on the Stagg 20 yardline, the Rebels moved right into the lead with Tim Koselke throwing a touchdown pass to Ted Miles from eight yards out. The lead did not last long, however, as Stagg recovered a Koselke fumble in Rebel territory. Several plays later the game was tied with Stagg scoring on a twelve yard pass play.

Neither team could move the ball the rest of the first half so both teams entered the locker rooms tied at seven all.

A much more fighting team came out for South in the second half and they proved by marching all the way down for a score. Koselke carried the ball the final seven yards. Stagg could not move the ball much the second half as the Rebels, though very sloppy, got the job done. In three conference games now, the Rebels have given up only three touchdowns. For further games however, defense will not be enough. South's offense will have to start putting more points on the board if they are to win this year's conference crown.

There has never been an undefeated team at South. However, the way things are going this year, anything is possible. Right now the Rebels are 4-0 on the season and 3-0 in conference play. They are tied

with North for the top spot. But the last two games against Crete and Stagg have to be described as complete opposites. The Crete Warriors are not what

you would call the team to beat in the conference these days. They have not won a game as yet and it is not likely that they will either. Our mighty team won this game with relative ease. The starting team hung around long enough to build up a 24-0 halftime lead. That was the last action they saw the rest of the evening.

Early in the first quarter the Rebels moved methodically down the field for their first score. Mark Wojciehowski took the ball over from the six. After the successful conversion, the game turned all South. Twice more the Rebels scored in the first half. Dale Zentz and Wojo scored the two TD's or runs of 7 and 8 yards.
